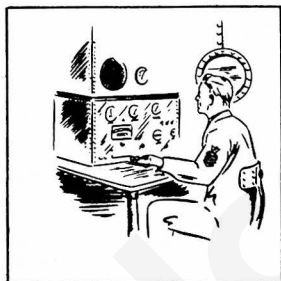
IN WAR EFFORT
