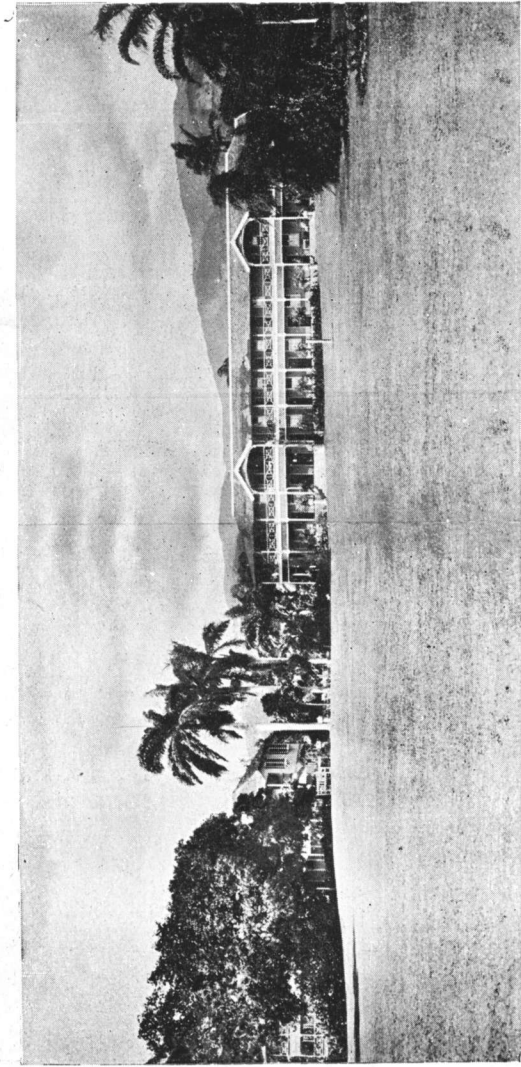

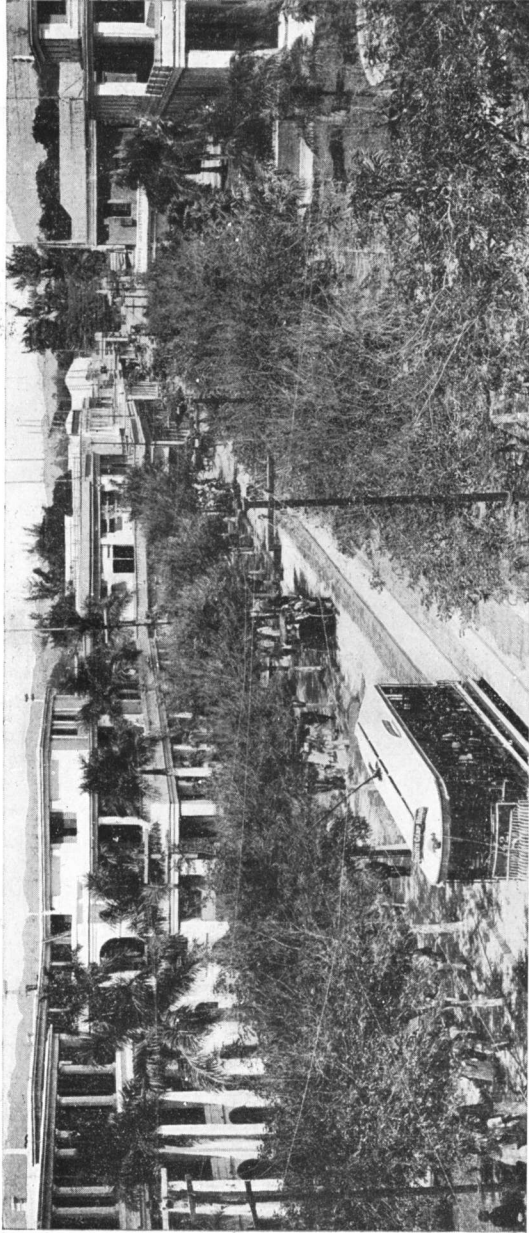

Cruise, New York—Jamaica (B.W.I.)—New York.**

SHORE PROGRAMME.

The time of arrival of the "Monarch of Bermuda" at Port Royal is about 8 a.m. Wednesday, 22nd May, 1935, and the vessel berths at the Leyland Line Pier, Kingston, about 9 a.m.

The Jamaica Military Band will play on the Pier, as the ship docks.

The local agents for the Furness Bermuda Line are Messrs. H. Macaulay Orrett, of which firm Mr. H. D. M. Orrett is the principal. Their office is situated at 62 Port Royal Street—one block west of Orange Street, about two minutes walk from the Pier.

The shopping centre of Kingston may be reached from the wharf by entering Harbour Street two blocks north of the pier, and proceeding to the right into King Street which, with Harbour Street, constitutes the most important shopping area.

The General Post Office is situated in one of the large Government Buildings in King Street, (on the left, going north) at the corner of Barry Street.

The Tourist Bureau is at 87 Barry Street, near the north-east corner of King and Barry Streets.

Myrtle Bank Hotel is in Harbour Street.

The Itinerary of the Half-day Motorcar Tour which has been arranged, is as follows:—

From the wharf along Harbour Street into King Street; on either side between Tower Street and Barry Street are the Government Buildings. Continuing up King Street the route passes through the Parade Gardens, along Sutton Street and through the native market section into the Spanish Town Road.

A few miles out of Kingston banana cultivations are seen on either side of the road. At seven miles, on crossing the Ferry River one sees on the right the old building which, as "The Ferry Inn," was the scene of great revelry a century ago when it was a road-house largely patronized by resident officials and the gentry of the island. A little farther on is a large Ceiba tree (locally known as silk-cotton) which, owing to its mention by Michael Scott, in "Tom Cringle's Log," has become very widely known.

Continuing, after passing more banana plantations and one or two cane fields, Spanish Town is reached. Here, a visit is paid to the Cathedral (the oldest cathedral in the British colonies). Ten miles beyond Spanish Town, after ascending the beautiful gorge of the Rio Cobre, at the village of Bog Walk the route turns into the hills, and after passing through several fertile valleys mounts up to Stony Hill where the main range of the Island is crossed at about 1,300 feet.

Descending the Southern slope, Constant Spring is reached at the end of three miles. Driving through the residential suburbs and past the entrance to King's House, the Governor's residence, the Government botanical gardens at Hope are visited. On the way back to the city, the route lies through Up-Park-Camp (the military station) and past the picturesque Roman Catholic Cathedral, the dome of which is conspicuous in approaching the city from the sea.

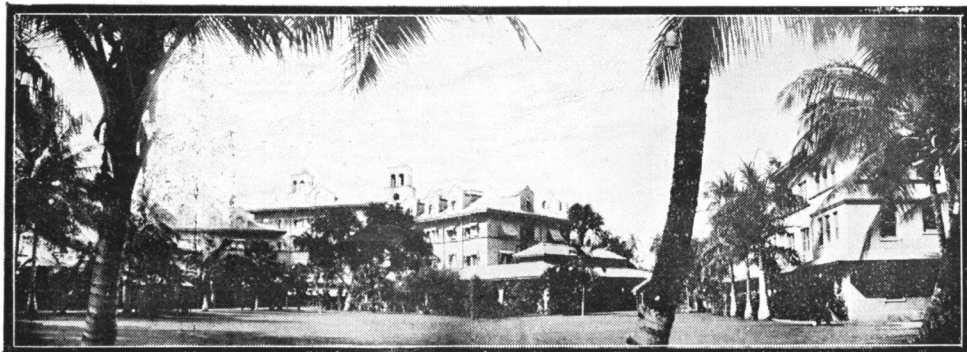

JAMAICA.

Jamaica and its dependencies (Turks and Caicos Islands, the Cayman Islands and the Morant and Pedro Cays), have an area of more than one-third, and nearly half the population of the British West Indies.

Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, His Excellency Sir Edward Brandis Denham, G.C.M.G., K.B.E.

THE ISLAND OF JAMAICA is centrally situated in the Caribbean Sea, 1,457 miles from New York, 90 miles from the nearest point in Cuba and 550 miles from the Panama Canal.

Jamaica possesses the highest mountain in the British West Indies — Blue Mountain Peak, 7,388 ft. The island is very mountainous, beautiful and fertile, with practically every kind of scenery, climate and tropical products to be found anywhere in the West Indies.

The area of Jamaica is 4,450 square miles—greatest length and width, 144 miles by 49 miles. It is third in size of the numerous islands comprising the West Indies.

Jamaica has one of the finest natural harbours in the world—Kingston harbour—and there are many excellent bathing beaches around the coast.

Jamaica's climate for winter residence and for holidays throughout the year—is ideal. At sea-level the average temperature is 78.8 degrees; at 1,000 feet, 75 degrees; at 4,000 feet, 65 degrees, and so on. Jamaica has no severe heat-waves in summer nor cold weather in winter. A fine chain of hotels offers accommodation at seaside and mountain resorts.

The people of Jamaica number about one million. They all speak English and are very hospitable to visitors. There are no poisonous snakes nor savage wild animals.

Jamaica's intriguing history is romantic and colourful. The island was discovered by Christopher Columbus in 1494, and taken from the Spaniards by British forces, under Penn and Venables in 1655.

Port Royal was the rendezvous of the 17th century buccaneers; and the names of many of Britain's naval heroes are associated with the island.

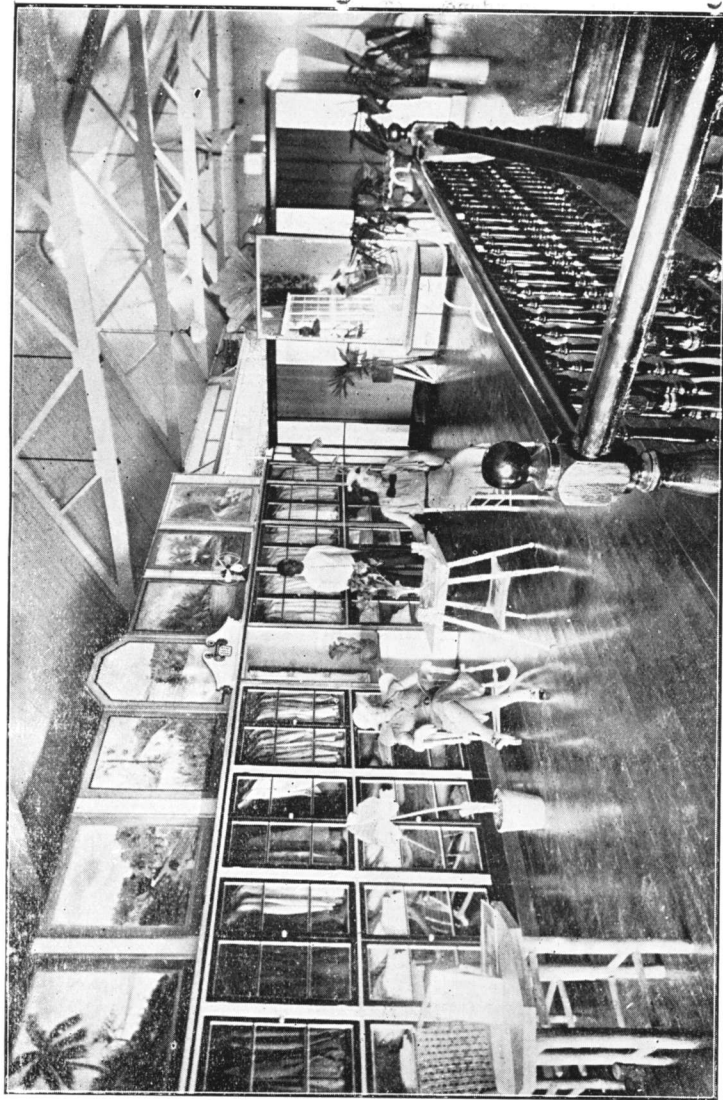
Jamaica's world-famous products include: Bananas, sugar and rum, Blue Mountain coffee, pimento (allspice), ginger, grapefruit, oranges and limes, coconuts, cocoa, sarsaparilla, pine-apples, mangoes and other tropic fruits, cashew nuts, honey, sisal, hides and goat skins, logwood and other dyes, cattle, vegetables, Jippi Jappa (Jamaica Panama) hats, baskets and curios, etc.

The Jamaica Government Railway connects Kingston (on the south side) with the north-eastern and north-western ends of the island, the total mileage being 210.

Thermal mineral springs, at Milk River and at Bath, possess great curative properties, the radio-activity of the former ranking high compared with that of European spa waters.

Jamaica's scenic tours (both by sea-coast and mountainous interior roads) compare favourably with the world's finest drives. There are several thousand miles of good roads.
