Gentlemen:

We have received a disturbing report from Mr. J. M. Transue, our plant protection expert, following his examination of your 8th Street plant at Watsontown on November 12, 1945.

We quote from Mr. Transue's report:

"An inspection made at the above premises on Monday, November 12, 1945, revealed conditions which are considered as serious. As much as 50% overloading of floors was found in certain of the areas, and in view of the danger of this practice, we strongly urge that the practice be discontinued immediately.

Congestion in the basement was quite serious, and if a fire occurred, it would be practically impossible to reach it in view of the congested aisles."

May we urge that this situation receive your immediate attention and that steps be taken at once to remedy the conditions found.

The writer cannot understand Mr. Transus's report in lieu of the writer's personal inspection of our Watsontown, Pennsylvania's, properties the week of October 29 wherein the writer personally made an inspection of every floor in our plant and found that all the rules, regulations and conditions recommended by your Mr. Fransus were being complied with.

As Mr. Transue's inspection was made November 12.

It maybe possible that one or two carloads of material wre
received at one time and in lieu of the present freight demurrage charge, as well as the fact that we were compelled to
move the material which we had stored at the Watsenteen Cabinet
Company, that the labor shortage did not permit a 100% compliance.
However, we are writing to our Watsenteen, Pennsylvania, plant
to receive their opinions

In lieu of the writer's visit to Watsontown and his inspection of the plant which was very close to the time of Mr. Transue's inspection, we certainly hope that he will immediately make another survey and advise us accordingly. Should any infringement or transgressions from the Property Safety rules being in violation at that time, we will assure you that they will immediately be corrected.
